In these crazy days of struggle, of sorrow, of busyness, of national problems and of personal issues, God's love for you is really what is most important. And all sorts of people around you need to know about that love from you. Follow Jesus.



#### SINGING IN WORSHIP IMPROVES OVERALL HEALTH



ews outlets like Huffington Post, National Public Radio, and even the ELCA magazine, *Living Lutheran*, are sharing the news from researchers in Sweden. What they have discovered is that singing in choir and in worship is a form of physical/spiritual therapy. "When you sing the phrases, it is a form of guided breathing," Bjorn Vickoff, a musicologist who led the research told NPR. "When you exhale, the heart slows down. Members of the choir and congregation synchronize externally with the melody and the rhythm, and now we see it has an internal counterpart."

The internal counterpart is the actual heart being influenced by singing. Heartbeats gradually synchronize, eventually beating as one, with the song's tempo as a guide. It is a real way to reduce stress, much like yoga. People often report that they "feel better" for having gone to worship. Not only can you lift your spirits, but reduce stress through singing in church. Praising God with others has tangible benefits. Don't you deserve to feel better? Come sing with us.

### AMAZING GENEROSITY

Close to 30 years ago, some very forward-thinking leaders at Zoar had a vision of creating an endowment for the church. Not only did they create the bylaws and governing documents, but they also funded the fund by purchasing life insurance policies on themselves. This fund has been growing ever since.

Now in excess of \$2 million, the Foundation has three main funds. The Kurfis fund generates income yearly for youth specific ministries. The Kazmaier Fund generates income for persons preparing for ordained ministry in the ELCA. The Regular Fund generates income for a wide variety of initiatives and projects.

It is a testament to a profound understanding of stewardship as a way of life that created these funds. Men and women long before today's present members laid a financial foundation for Zoar ministries well into the future.

It is a lesson Zoarites can learn over and over again. Who are the next people God is going to touch to leave a legacy gift for Zoar's future?



#### BLOCK PARTY FOR REDEEMER Sunday, August 28, at 1:00 p.m.



Surgery will be tomorrow morning at 7:30 a.m. Will last between 4-6 hours. Please, please, pray for our baby girl. We love her SO much! All of you know how perfect, beautiful and sassy she is! Want to share our good news!! Everything went as planned!! Hurray!! He removed the coarctation and widened her narrow aorta arch. Now to watch her blood pressure. It's high right now because of the fact the blood flow was restricted before. Once they get blood pressure under control, they can work on reducing the sedation and taking her off the vent. Not out of the woods yet, but a major hurdle cleared today!!! Rejoicing with the family and praising God!! Thank you to EVERYONE in Chloe's Corner who has sent prayers for her the past three days! We are feeling

all of your love and support! (Posted May 16)

The BEST feeling in the world! After an entire week, we were finally able to hold Chloe again! Removed her breathing tube this morning. Now to get her chest tube out and wean her meds down and get her back to eating good! Been a whirlwind of a week, but we are just grateful Dr. Si was able to fix her heart! The road to recovery will be long, but she's made great strides the past 2 days! (Posted May 19)

Chloe is 3 months old today. The past 2 weeks have been the toughest of her little life, but she has amazed everyone with how brave and strong and sassy she is! 1 in 120 babies are born with a congenital heart defect. Many get diagnosed at birth or a few short weeks after. We will never know how she made it 11 weeks. God has such a way with performing miracles, and John and I are so glad Chloe is one of them. ### ELCA CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY



#### August 8-13, 2016

hat is the ELCA Churchwide Assembly? As many of you know, the Northwestern Ohio Synod holds an assembly every year to conduct the business of the church in its expression as a synod. (This year, part of that business was to elect a new bishop.) The Churchwide Assembly is now held every three years, and will be held in New Orleans in August. Those elected to attend either the synod or churchwide are called voting members. They are not delegates because when these assemblies are in session, they are the church. (Three expressions – congregation, synod, churchwide. Reminds me of the trinity...)

I have had the honor and privilege of being a voting member at both synod and churchwide assemblies, and I encourage everyone to consider serving your church in this manner. The Presiding Bishop manages the assembly, and according to the ELCA website: When the ELCA Churchwide Assembly convenes, its voting members meet with confidence in God's grace around word and water, wine and bread, to carry on their work on behalf of the entire church. Over the course of the assembly, voting members:


\*Hear reports and review the work of churchwide officers, leaders and units;

\*Receive and consider proposals from synod assemblies;

\*Elect officers, board members and other leaders as specified by the Constitution or Bylaws; establish ELCA churchwide policy; worship together;

\*Adopt a budget; and Conduct other business related to the ELCA churchwide organization.

When members of the assembly participate in and make decisions about the mission and ministry of the ELCA: We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. We are church for the sake of the world. Churchwide and synod assemblies provide information about how the ELCA impacts individuals in the church and in the world! I'm a Lutheran because it fits my personality pack light; keep it simple; embrace life; celebrate diversity; jettison needless rules; stand up to authority when the truth needs a hand; and dance through the blessing of life on Earth like a child in God's eyes.

#### From I-75 South:

Take the US-20/US-23 exit (exit number 193) toward PERRYSBURG/FREMONT. Then Turn left onto N. Sandusky St. (US-23/US-20) Zoar is about a mile ahead on the right side of the road.

#### From I-75 North:

Merge onto Sandusky St/US-20 (exit number 193) toward PERRYSBURG/FORT MEIGS. Keep going straight. Zoar is about a mile ahead on the right side of the road.
