From I-75 South:


Take the US-20/US-23 exit (exit number 193) toward


Zoar is catching a real sense of that old time missionary energy. We understand


from Pastor Tim

BRINGING RELIEF TO THE WORLD

As the civil war in Syria continues, the number of displaced people and refugees continue to grow into the millions. Zoar is there on the scene through Lutheran World Relief. With thousands of Lutherans around the world, we provide quilts and kits to bring comfort and warmth to many thousands of families fleeing their homes. In the past few months, Lutheran World Relief has shipped quilts and kits to Peru, Tanzania and India to distribute to people in need.

Last year, Zoar contributed 129 quilts, 76 baby care kits, 4 fabric kits, 96 personal care kits, 115 school kits, and 28 pounds of soap. *Our goal for this year is to exceed those numbers.*

And on Saturday, **October 15th** starting at 9:00 a.m. we will pack the quilts and kits so they can be delivered by more Zoar volunteers in trucks and vans to St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Pemberville, OH.

TO LIVE LONGER WORSHIP MORE OFTEN

In May of this year, the Journal of the American Medical Association released a new study that says church services are not just good for your soul, they are also good for your health. Tyler VanderWeele, a researcher at Harvard's school of public health who co-wrote the story, said those who attend church services more often actually have a better chance of staying alive in the long run. The positive effect of church attendance diminished as study participants decreased their service attendance. The



study's authors reached a surprising conclusion: "Religion and spirituality may be an underappreciated resource that physicians could explore with their patients, as appropriate."


VanderWeele said that other studies have pointed to a similar link between service attendance and de-

creased mortality, but his team aimed to prove that service attendance actually causes better health outcomes. After studying more than 76,000 female nurses over a 20 year period, the women who attended services weekly showed a 33 percent chance of living longer.

SURVEY SAYS!

Last month the Zoar Facebook Group page featured a survey asking about people's drive time to Zoar. With 49 responding, a third (33%) drive less than 5 minutes,;29% drive 6-10 minutes; 24% drive 11-15 minutes; and everyone else that responded drives over 15 minutes.





All current 7th graders are invited to join in a two-year commitment to Confirmation/Catechism Education.




