### THREE TRUTHS FOR LIFE

his past May, the Lutheran World Federation (a world-wide association of Lutheran churches) met in Namibia, at which the Lutheran Namibian Archbishop, Musa Panti Filibus, was elected as President of the Federation. Interestingly, they met not in Wittenberg, Germany, on the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation, but in an area in which there are more Lutherans than in Europe or the U.S. The Lutheran movement has become so much more than just brats and kraut (or lutefisk and lefse). It remains centered on God's grace seen in the cross and empty grave of




Jesus.

#### **SACRED ART SHOW**



The Liturgical Arts committee has assembled a SACRED ART SHOW to be viewed Saturday, June 10 and Sunday, June 11 between 4pm – 8pm or before any church service. This collection includes works of twelve artists from across the country. One goal of the Arts Committee is to secure a legacy of fine art throughout the building to enrich our surroundings, promote thought and discussion through the interpretation of art, and to glorify God through the creations made by religious artists. We have identified several areas where artwork would be appropriate: Gathering Space, Sanctuary entranc-

es and Children's hallway. This collection includes many styles and themes. Prices range from \$50 - \$2000. Our hope is that members of Zoar will purchase a piece of art that engages them, and donate it to the church. For larger, more expensive pieces, donations may be "bundled together". It is also possible to commission a piece of art, based on the style represented at the show. Members of the Arts Committee will be available to talk about the pieces and answer questions about the artist and their work. 


### SUMMER MEANS VACATION
