ZOAR: CHRISTIANITY FOR A NEW GENERATION

hile Mark Twain was in London in 1897 concerns circulated that he was gravely ill, followed by a rumor that he had died. When Twain was told about this by a reporter, he quipped: "The reports of my death are greatly exaggerated." Much the same could be said of Christianity in the US these days. Polls released by the respected Pew Center reveal that Christianity is experiencing significant changes. Changing yes, dying no. One major change in Christianity is that more and more people under 35 do not identify as Christian. They are not anti-Jesus, or opposed to God, so to speak. They just have separated themselves from the institution of the church and official Christianity. Their top reasons include perceived hostility on the part of "Christians" to gays and lesbians, "Christian" rejection of modern science, "Christian" judgmentalism against those who are different, and the association of "Christianity" with a specific political party. Pew Center's 2007 Religious Landscape study, which surveyed 35,000 respondents, found that about 16% of Americans claimed no religious affiliation. By 2015, that number had grown to 23%, almost one in four Americans. If this trend continues, and most researchers believe that it will, the "unaffiliated" or "nones" of society will become increasingly prominent and perhaps even become a majority.

Last January as I started my term as Council President we held a retreat at 577 Foundation to set goals for the coming year. As we approach the end of my term not everything is complete, but we have made a lot of progress. This year has been an education for me in the truth of Paul's letter to the Romans. He writes: "As in one body, we have many members and all the members do not have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another."

If what is true of all American society is true of the Toledo area, where does that leave Zoar? Are we a church soon to be over-taken by the departures of the younger generations? Are we a church that is going to die-out as our oldest members join the church triumphant? By no means! The reason is this. Of all the things that the "nones' or "unaffiliated" list as turn-offs to church, Zoar is the opposite. Zoar is the Toledo-area answer for adults under 35 who have checked-out of organized Christianity. This new generation values acceptance gays and lesbians as children of God. That is Zoar! For "nones" who prize science, Zoar is the place! We practice a Christianity that has celebrated science since Luther. For those looking for a judgement free zone, Zoar is that zone! Have you noticed the young Muslim woman who attends Zoar weekly? She comes because she feels loved and not judged. For those tired of political agendas in religion, again, Zoar is free from particular political party or ideology. These are the facts. As you look to the future and wonder what is in store for your church in a nation where religion seems to be slipping away, remind yourself that Zoar is what today's religious pilgrims are seeking. The only question, really, is are we willing to do what is necessary to reach them?

One of the first things Jesus did in ministry was to form a small group. He had the "twelve": Peter, James, John, Andrew, Nathanael, James the Younger, Judas, Thaddeus, Matthew, Philip, Simon the Zealot, and Thomas. Then there were the women disciples in his inner circle: Mary, Martha, Joana, Mary Magdalene, Susanna, and Salome. Jesus moved among the crowds and large-scale events, to be sure. But the majority of his time was spent in the intimacy of a small group. This was key to his spiritual focus. These men and women became a life line for him. In Jesus's last recorded prayer, he says that they were God's gifts to him. God has gifts to give you, too. People gifts. We want to help surround you with people who help your life become all that God intends for it.



LIVING THE GIFTS MAJORITY OF WORSHIPERS IN A GROUP

Jesus established a small group with twelve seemingly unqualified and unprepared men of diverse backgrounds, and yet it worked because Jesus **Gathered** the group in relationship so that they would **Grow** in faith through fellowship and learning from the Master, and finally they would **Give** the Good News of crucified and risen Jesus Christ to the world. Gather, Grow, and Give—that is what Zoar small groups are all about.

Zoar currently has 25 small groups with about 250 members. Some of those groups are focused on recreation or a specific topic. However, the majority of the groups are what we call either Christ Care Groups or Date Night Groups.

WE'VE GOT A GROUP FORYOU

Seventeen of the twenty-five small groups are Christ Care groups. These are groups that meet to discuss significant, meaningful themes while maintaining a strong spiritual engagement among the members of the group. These groups of 6 to 12 gather (generally in homes) to develop friendships. As they meet regularly, they grow together in faith and understanding through materials that challenge and encourage that faith and understanding. Finally, as they are led, they give of themselves as the group or individuals in response to what Jesus has done for them.

GATHER/GROW/GIVE REUNITED FAMILIES

LUTHERANS AND CATHOLICS WORKTOGETHER

Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Office of Migration and Refugee Services (USCCB/MRS) released a report recently entitled Serving Separated and Reunited Families: Lessons Learned and the Way Forward to Promote Family Unity. The report documents the work of Lutheran and Catholic agencies who assisted the Administration with reuniting separated families during the month of July and provides recommendations for a more humane way forward. "I am tremendously proud of how guickly LIRS, USCCB/MRS, and our Lutheran and Catholic partners nationwide, stepped up to provide support for families during this time of crisis," said Kay Bellor, Vice President of Programs for LIRS. "As we have been for decades, communities of faith were there, poised and ready, to love and serve our neighbors in need. It is our deep hope that the lessons learned from this time in our history will prevent the cruel separation of children from their parents from happening again." In July 2018, LIRS and USCCB/MRS assisted over 1200 families who were reunified after being separated under the Administration's "Zero Tolerance" policy. The report highlights the work that was undertaken by Lutheran and Catholic partners on the ground, and gives a unique data point regarding the separated and reunited families. THE BOOK OF JUDGES BEGINNING JANUARY 6TH

The Old Testament book of Judges introduces the story of Israel in the land of Canaan. It highlights how rapidly Israel fell into religious, military and social crisis, necessitating a new societal structure: the Judean monarchy. The book features a sequence of stories featuring unlikely, morally ambiguous, but charismatic heroes. Over the course of the narrative oppression grows, saviors are less effective, and the book ends in a bloody civil war. The violence and questionable behavior of Israel and its Judges may lead readers to ask, "What's a nasty book like this doing in the Bible?"

Beginning Sunday January 6th, Dr. Donna Laird will lead an eight-week Sunday morning exploration of this problematic book. In the process we will consider how this book of self-critique about a people that lost its way might speak to our own community and society. Class will meet at 9:45 in the Conference Room.


