OUT OF MANY ONE GOD

ach Sunday in February falls in the season of Epiphany, a time when we celebrate that God's goodness and blessing in Jesus Christ is for all the nations of the world. Our world is a diverse place with different languages, cultures, peoples, and religions. It is a multi-religious world. We see that with the reading from January 6 when the wise men came from the East. The East was probably Persia and their religion likely, Zoroastrianism. Jesus was born into and for a multi-religious world. For the ELCA, a diversity of religious belief systems coexisting in society isn't a threat—it's an invitation to conversation and understanding. "It's part of our baptismal vocation as Lutherans," says Kathryn Lohre, assistant to the ELCA presiding bishop and executive for ecumenical and interreligious relations. "We're responding faithfully to [Martin] Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment by engaging in mutual understanding." In explaining that commandment, Luther wrote: "We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light" (Small Catechism).

LOVE GOD, LOVEYOUR NEIGHBOR CHANGE THE WORLD

February. In the Church it is the season after the Epiphany, during which Magi (non-Jews, non-believers) came to visit the young Jesus. Also, we are reminded of St. Valentine, who while awaiting martyrdom for his Christian faith sent a note to his loved one, as we now send notes of love.

Both images tie in with an amazing event I attended this past November. The Parliament of World Religions was held in Toronto, at which 7000 people attended, representing over 200 religions. People were present from all around this world.

Throughout the week I encountered Hindus, Jains, Buddhists, Christians (of several denominations), Sikhs, Baha'is, Zoroastrians, First People (Native Americans), Jews, Muslims, and many more. A few of the special speakers included Jim Wallis (editor of Sojourners magazine), the grandson of Gandhi, and a skyped-in conversation with the Dalai Lama. Here are just a few of the things I learned:

- This world is much more diverse and complex than I can imagine. And through this diversity, God's light shines brightly.
- When people come together in love, no matter from where they come, respect and care fill the conversation. Laughter knows no boundaries! We need more of this in our culture.

- The love of Jesus and His cross and empty grave that are so central to me are buttressed by John 3:16, where we read that "God so loved the world..." All the world is wrapped in the hands of our loving God.

-And I was reminded of the privilege of being a white, U.S. citizen, male, English-speaker in this world of color and diversity.

This event opened a new spot in my heart. Now, a few months later I continue to reflect on what I learned and who I met. So what?

One answer is reflected in an Episcopal theme, "Love God, Love your Neighbor, Change the World." If only we Christians could/would. To be the love of Jesus in the world is at the heart of the Gospel. Another is to connect in deeper ways with the Interfaith community here in Toledo, sharing God's love. Another is to pray, to thank, to worship Jesus, the Lord of All.

That's a start for February. How do you see the love of God reaching out through you to a neighbor or a stranger? The Magi and Valentine are teaching us yet – to be the love of God!

This has been the basis for the ELCA's interreligious work over the last three decades. Soon after its formation, the ELCA recognized non-Christians as neighbors by establishing the ELCA Consultative Panel on Lutheran-Jewish Relations. In 1994 the ELCA was the first Lutheran denomination to apologize to the Jewish people and repudiate Luther's anti-Semitic writings from 1543. In 2008, in response to an open letter from Muslim leaders looking for common ground and understanding with Christians, the ELCA Consultative Panel on Lutheran-Muslim Relations was formed. This year the church has reflected deeply on how to continue to serve Muslim and Jewish neighbors. In January, President Donald Trump attempted to restrict entry of refugees and visitors from predominantly Muslim countries into the U.S. A month later there were attacks on Jewish cemeteries in Missouri and Pennsylvania, and threats of violence against 13 Jewish community centers across the country. In reaction to these occurrences, ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton issued statements encouraging members and congregations to "[reach] out and [show] up with our Jewish neighbors" and to "offer safety to people fleeing religious persecution regardless of their faith tradition." Eaton also appointed the ELCA Interreligious Task Force in 2016 to develop a draft interreligious policy statement that is slated to be presented to the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. FEBRUARY 16TH 7:30 PM






