GRATITUDE

November is one of my top 12 months! (actually, all are good, with blessings and beauty.) The warm summer months are long over, the harvest is in, and it's time to hunker down for the holidays.

There are two festivals that bookend the month, framing these days with import. At the beginning is All Saints. Here a marvelous group of faithful disciples have taught us about God's love! Some of these were Zoar folk, but many have been in our lives with their special gifts of grace. Some are ancient, like Mary Magdalene, or Martin Luther, or Zoar's first pastor, George Cronenwett. Some have just entered into heaven this past year, and we remember them with grace. The author of Hebrews reminds us that we are "surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses."

These saints ultimately bring us to gratitude, for it is through their life and ministry that we are enriched. Thank you, Eternal God, for the saints who have taught us about You!

Then we come to the end of the month, and the whole cultures stops to give thanks. We sing, "Come, ye thankful

people, come," and gather in praise and blessing. Of course, this holiday is not just worship (although that is the primary purpose behind the holiday), it is also family getting together, traditional foods, remembering the saints, and gratitude.

WORSHIP IN NOVEMBER

During November we are asked to contemplate endings. And as we ponder together, we hold on and trust in God's promises.

November 2 & 3 All Saints

On the Sermon on the Plain, Jesus addresses us directly in a congratulatory manner: "Happy are you!" who endure for the sake of the Gospel. The hymn, Behold, the Host Arrayed in White, ELW 425, gives a clue regarding this "happy" yoke of the saints: "On earth their work was not thought wise,/ but see them now in heaven's eyes; / before God's thrones of precious stone / they shout their victory cries. / On earth they wept through bitter years; / now God has wiped away their tears, / transformed their life to heavenly life, / and freed them from their fears...."

November 9 & 10

Today we hear some of the most confident readings outside of Easter. Job testifies: "For I know my Redeemer lives... and my eyes shall behold, and not another." In the Gospel, Jesus says, "God is not the God of the dead, but of the living...." The hymn, Jesus is My Sure Defense, ELW 621, admonishes us, "Take comfort and rejoice, / for his people Christ will cherish. / Fear not, you will hear his voice; / dying, you will never perish..."

November 16 & 17

Things we deem valuable may not last. In 2 Thessalonians we are encouraged to live in the here and now, always doing what is right. We are to look after each other and must lend a helping hand when others face life's troubles. The hymn, Through the Night of Doubt and Sorrow, ELW 327, casts a wide net: those who are under the shadow of "doubt, sorrow, darkness, gloom, terror, conflict, peril, and the shame of the cross," are those whom we must offer help.

November 23 & 24 Christ the King


Today we encounter the King of creation in the bitter throes of his Passion, and we ask ourselves, "Who is Jesus?" Luke makes a case for a King who reigns from the cross. Lord Christ, When First You Came to Earth, ELW 727, states, "O awesome love which finds no room in life where sin denies you, / and, doomed to death, shall bring to doom the power that crucifies you..."

Amen.


ZOAR YOUTH//

ALL SA

There is a lot of meaning packed into the word all in All Saints. Let's explore the day through this simple word.


All includes those most beloved to us. All Saints calls to mind specific individuals: particular beloved faces, names and memories. On All Saints, we will name in worship our loved ones who have died in the past year. We may be all too aware of the particular names we are now carrying with us toward All Saints this year—names of those who have died in the past months.

All includes those beloved by others. All Saints creates a space that embraces with honor the multitudes of individuals among the beloved dead. We see their faces, say their names, and recognize in the worshipers around us others who carry their own memories and litanies of saints. All Saints sets out a place for all of them-an assembly the book of Revelation describes as "a number no one could count" with saints "from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages" (7:9). All Saints brings into focus our own beloved dead while also stretching our imagination toward the whole company of saints, more diverse and populous than we can fully comprehend.

All are saved by grace. The festival originally honored those who were considered especially holy: heroic figures from the Scriptures and martyrs who had given their lives nonviolently in witness to the faith. However, it is an especially Lutheran accent for the feast to honor not only those who lived exemplary lives, but all who have been baptized into Christ's death. For Lutherans, All Saints resonates with the conviction that in Christ every saint is a sinner and every sinner a saint, *simul justus et peccator*. Lutherans especially remember on this feast that it is God's grace, apart from our works, that makes us saints. We find lasting rest only in the mercy of God.

We share a mortal, earthy nature with all humans and all living creatures on the planet. Death is an inevitable part of life for all of us. It is part of our citizenship as earth creatures. In the Bible's wisdom literature, the word all is like a bell ringing to remind us of the lesson of Ash Wednesday: The fate of humans and the fate of animals is the same; as one dies, so dies the other. They all have the same breath All go to one place; all are from the dust, and all turn to dust again (Ecclesiastes 3:19-20). John's Gospel uses seed imagery: Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit (12:24). All Saints proclaims a mystery. We remain in communion with those who have returned to the earth ahead of us.

We wait with all creation. All Saints is commemorated when much of the North American landscape appears to be dying down. Days are shorter, tree branches are becoming bare, the air is colder and fields have been stripped of their harvest. November begins a cycle of readings extending through Advent in which the themes of death and danger are in dialogue with our deepest hopes. As the sun sinks lower in the sky each day, our Scripture texts help



us seek answers to a searing question: "How can we live in hope and integrity when it looks like the end of the world?" All Saints begins a season in which we contemplate the hopes and fears of all creation, watching and waiting for signs of a new day dawning for all of us.

The themes of All Saints extend into all of Christian life. We call to mind every Sunday the great company of saints as we join their unending hymn around the communion table. We bear witness to new saints being born from the baptismal waters. Perhaps we visit a cemetery on the anniversary of a death or on other church festivals. And every time we see the sign of the cross or trace it on our bodies, we remember the one whose death and resurrection has formed this company of all the saints, hallowing all our lives and deaths.

All Saints reimagines the world—all of it. Even in death, God is making all things new.

GATHER/GROW/GIVE EXPLORE ZOAR OVER 80 CONNECTIONS MADE!

The Explore Zoar Ministry Fair was held in the FLC on September 8, both continuing and refreshing the long-held tradition of Rally Sunday. The purpose of the fair was to connect all the people of Zoar, from first-time visitors to long-time members, with the multiple ministry opportunities within Zoar and to also connect with one another. Over fifty-five groups held interactive, engaging booths, giving visitors a taste, sometimes quite literally, of what they do and provide information on how to get involved. Booths contained information and sign-up sheets as well as anything from snacks to games to science demonstrations. The fair generated over eighty new sign-ups for Zoar ministries.

Linda Miller signed up to join three groups at Explore Zoar. When asked why, she replied with a smile, "I think I'm qualified because, I know I can cook, I can serve food and I can pray." Though she serves on Altar Guild and has previously sung in the choir, she was searching for a way to get more involved, in response to recent life changes. "I have a lot of free time and I'm trying to get busier and keep myself busy."

Interim Associate Pastor Cindy Ritter found the ministry fair helpful and exciting, especially as a newcomer to Zoar. "To go around and to meet the people who were in charge of all the different ministries and to be able to ask them questions and to be able to sign up for a few things I'm interested in learning more about, I thought was wonderful," she said. "It is exciting that there's so much going on. For me I witnessed that there's something for everyone, whether you're a man a woman or a child ...things of faith, things of fellowship, things of mission, things of fun, and I am going to say the food was delicious."



Fairgoers overwhelmingly and consistently mentioned how encouraging it

was to see the FLC come alive with the energy of so many people excited about becoming involved at Zoar."Walking in and having not only everybody interacting with what was going on but with each other...there was an electricity in the room," said Pastor Tim. "There was an excitement with all the stuff here, but even more so, with all the people, and that's what made the day for me."

Carol Henschen, of Rachel Circle, echoed Pastor Tim's sentiments. "I was impressed by how much electricity was going through [the room]," she said.

Miller agreed. "It's very nice in there...very welcoming, very energetic."
