LOVE FOR ALL CREATION

Ah, February. This is the month in-between. It's not really winter, although winter usually hangs on. It's not spring either. It's the end of the Sundays-after-Epiphany, and the beginning of Lent. We're done with our New Year's Resolutions, What's next?

One surprise this year is that there is a "Leap Day." The marvel for me is this: God has so created the universe with so much complexity, longevity, and beauty, and still so much that we cannot grasp. We have struggled to control time and the passage of the seasons. But with all our good intentions, a day needs to be added every fourth year, or not added if the year ends in "00." The movement of the earth around the sun and the wobble of the earth are all part of God's amaZing glory that cannot be put in a box.

One response to God's glory is evident right smack in the middle of the month. Because of his love for Jesus, St. Valentine refused to renounce his faith, and was martyred. On his way, he wrote a note to his loved one. Valentine's Day is so much more than the giving of notes, chocolate and flowers, but it is the day to respond to the awesomeness of the God whose love for all creation is endless.

With so much trouble and strife in our culture and world we are called to respond as to how this love of God is for all people, and how, as disciples of Jesus, we too love – not only the good people we know, but the neighbor, the one in need, the outcast, the stranger, even the enemy. This is what makes our faith so important in these days – no one is outside of our love!

At the end of this month, we will enter Lent (Ash Wednesday is February 26TH). There we will journey to the cross where God, having entered into our humanity, gives God's very self for the world, for the sake of you and me. Here is love personified, wrapped in flesh, gifted freely. At the cross we find the reason for St. Valentine's faith, we find the purpose of God, we find our calling.

May this in-between month with an extra day of joy be one for you in which you expand your response to this great Love, as you too are wrapped in grace!

WORSHIP IN FEBRUARY

In February, Zoar will continue exploring the themes of the season of light, and on the 26th, Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. The following are some theological perspectives based on the writings of Gail Ramshaw.

February 2, Presentation of Our Lord

On the fortieth day after Christmas, the medieval Western church celebrated the story in Luke 2, which conflates two rituals: the presentation to God of one's firstborn son, who was then bought back-redeemed-with the offering of animals destined for sacrifice; and the purification of the mother after childbirth. In keeping with the liturgical practice of forty-day observances, this celebration concludes the Incarnation cycle.

February 9, Fifth Sunday after Epiphany

To be light in the world, we must reflect the Light who is Christ. Light is an image on many Sundays. However, the Sermon on the Mount speaks also speaks of the lampstand. Paul would remind us that, contrary to the wisdom of the world, our lampstand is the cross.

February 16, Sixth Sunday after Epiphany

In Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, Jesus cited the commands of the Jewish law and then intensified and interiorized them. This narrative accords with the evangelist's sense that Jesus Christ fulfilled the Israelite tradition by moving the focus of the law from outward behavior to interior attitudes.

February 23, Transfiguration of Our Lord

Jesus' divinity shows forth on the Mount of Transfiguration, and by next Sunday, we are in Lent, when his humanity fully present as he goes to die upon Mount Calvary. Historically the Transfiguration was celebrated on August 6, a date now marked by the memory of the bombing of Hiroshima.

February 26, Ash Wednesday

The Old Testament tells of a ritual in which persons in great sorrow sat in ashes or poured them on their head. Since early medieval times, ashes were distributed on the fortieth day before Easter as a sign of individual and communal penitence. At the Synod of Benevento in 1091, the ritual was recommended for all Western Christians. The twin emphases of the day are sin and death: in sorrow for sin, we join with ancient peoples to put ashes on our head; and in honesty about death, we remember that, like Adam, we are made of dust and will return to dust.

March 1, First Sunday in Lent

Each year, Lent begins with a synoptic account of the temptation of Jesus. Jesus was truly human, suffering from the devil's temptations no less than we, and so he can stand by us when we are tempted. We too, conquer evil with the power of God's word: and that word for us is Christ. On this weekend, our guest preacher will be the esteemed writer and Pastor Paul Hoffman.

Clay jars are fragile, breakable, delicate. They break or crack easily even though they are made solid through one of the most destructive forces on earth, fire. Although clay jars are so delicate what a beautiful story they tell. Clay can be found in creeks and river banks, dirty and unnoticed but with time and care and heated by fire they become beautiful works of art. It's not surprising that there are over 40 references to clay or clay jars in the Bible. It's not surprising that the Bible describes us as jars of clay.

Our Lenten Wednesday worship services will be centered on "jars." On Ash Wednesday, February 26TH we will each receive a small jar. That container will be one in which you may speak your prayers throughout these 40 days. The Jar we will remember at the Wednesday services is the one in which the ashes are contained, ashes that will be "imposed" on you and me, reminding us of our mortality, as well as calling us to hope in the God who continually forgives. Ash Wednesday worship will commence with a service at 7 AM designed for those going to work or school. We also will offer worship at 11 AM and 7 PM. Come and begin the journey into God's amaZing love.

February 26TH 7 AM, 11 AM & 7 PM Ash Wednesday

March 4TH 11 AM & 7 PM

The Jar of the Drink Offering in the Tabernacle (Numbers 4), a jar to remind us of the call to praise the God of all creation, and to continually pray to this God of love.

March 11[™] 11 AM & 7 PM

The large stone jars at the wedding banquet in Cana (John 2), from which Jesus changed water into wine. This will bring to our remembrance the amazing generosity of our God.

March 18[™] 11 AM & 7 PM

Matthew 26 is the scene of another jar, which held the ointment with which the woman anointed Jesus, preparing Him for His burial. This is a jar of mercy and great love.

March 25TH 11 AM & 7 PM

Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 4 that "we have this treasure in clay pots." In the midst of our brokenness and call to humility, God brings extraordinary grace & power in our lives. Here we are truly amaZed by God!

April 1ST 11 AM & 7 PM

Elijah was sent to care for a woman and her son (1 Kings 17). They had no more to eat, and were preparing to die. Elijah brought God's promise to her that her jar of oil would not run out, and the container of meal would not cease. God's promise was fulfilled, and the woman and her son survived. God's promises continue still to guide us.

This Lenten season the ELCA invites you to study, pray and give during ELCA World Hunger's 40 Days of Giving — for the good of our families, our neighbors and communities around the world. Follow along on Zoar's social media or download the 40 days of giving calendar at https://community.elca.org/40days as we worship, study, reflect, give, pray, hear and sing.



WORSHIP: Begin your week with the Word of God, preparing your heart and mind to learn more about what it means to hope during the season of Lent.

STUDY: Use ELCA World Hunger's 40 Days of Giving weekly Lenten study at home or at church to dive deeper into stories of hunger and hope this Lent.

REFLECT: Use these days to revisit and reflect on the weekly study readings, either in small groups or individually.

GIVE: As you journey through Lent, consider the ways in which your own gifts to ELCA World Hunger can create hope throughout the world.

PRAY: Use the prayers of intercession shown throughout the calendar this Lent as, together, we humbly ask for God's care and blessing over all creation. Prayers adapted from Sundays and Seasons (Augsburg Fortress, 2019).

HEAR: Read and reflect on the selected Bible verses for each week on your own, with your family or with a small group to hear the word of God this Lent.

SING: To close each week — and to remind yourself of the hope to come in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ - read the included hymn text, either to yourself or out loud as a group, or consider singing the full hymn in your prayer group, Bible study or worship service.

GATHER/GROW/GIVE

ZOAR HOSTS GUEST PASTOR PAUL HOFFMAN

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 29 AND SUNDAY, MARCH 1

Since 1982 Paul has served the Lutheran Church as an ordained pastor, fully immersed in the ministry of Word and Sacrament and the lives of those he's served.

Paul has been called by the Synod Council of the Northwest Washington Synod as a writer and teacher and shares his gifts throughout the country and world as a keynote speaker, workshop leader, teacher and clinician. While primarily teaching and writing about faith formation for adults, Paul is comfortable leading on a wide range of pastoral ministry topics related to baptismal theology and practice.

Paul is a widely sought teacher about parish renewal and bringing new Christians into the faith as disciples of Jesus. Faith formation for adults is a pathway to preparing those who have never (or at least not recently) had a relationship with Christ as a disciple. Using the tools of the ancient Catechumenate, Paul has a long history of helping congregations prepare to welcome new adults to the baptismal font and into a life of faith in Christ.

He has keynoted and led workshops in Seattle, in parishes and leadership conferences of many denominations across the country and in Oxford, Paris, St. Petersburg and, this November, Sweden.

Paul has also developed a process of mentoring newly ordained clergy in small cohorts, assisting them to find a place to study the scriptures



with colleagues, pray together, and strengthen their gifts for ministry in the years of their first call. Paul's latest book is in the Augsburg Fortress Worship Matters series and is a manual for Ministers of Hospitality (ushers, greeters, and others) in a parish setting. This volume joins a distinguished set of similar resources that Augsburg Fortress is offering for Assisting Ministers, Lectors, Intercessors, and now – Ministers of Hospitality.

Paul is preaching at Zoar in conjunction with Hearts, Hands, and Voices occurring at Zoar on February 29TH. This all day workshop is geared towards Pastors and Church musicians, but it is open to anyone who is interested.

SCAM EMAILS, BEWARE!

Dear Zoar Congregation,

I wanted to make all of you aware of an issue I was involved in a few weeks ago. I received an email from a person posing as Pastor Tim asking for gift cards for another Zoar congregation member. This was the second occurrence of this type of scam. The first time was via a text. I wanted to share this with you to make you aware that these types of communication from any staff member from Zoar are not real and not to be fooled by these criminals.

I wanted to also share with you some statistics about this type of fraud called "Phishing". The definition of **Phishing**: Act of attempting to acquire (sensitive) information by posing as a trustworthy entity.

Statistics:

Phishing attempts have grown 65% in the last year.

- 1 in 25 branded emails is a phishing email
- 76% of organizations have been targeted by phishing
- In 2018 there were 26,379 victims of phishing fraud

How to Prevent Phishing:

Below are several clues that can indicate that a message is a phishing attempt.

- The message uses misspelled email domains. Such as ZaorLutheran.com
- The message is written to invoke fear of sense of urgency
- The message includes a request for money, password, or other personal
- The message is poorly written and has spelling or grammatical errors.
