
GROOVE APPARATUS

MY CUP OVERFLOWS

All sorts of things come in jars – pickled herring, mayonnaise, peanut butter, monkeys (the old game Jar of Monkeys), pizza sauce, etc. This Lent we will look at six specific jars in Scripture and learn from them of God's generosity and grace. You will also receive a small jar to keep in a special place, one in which you will daily remember your prayers and blessings.

These jars and their accompanying scriptures are designed to help you on your journey to the Cross and Empty Grave. This 40-day journey, from Ash Wednesday to Easter, helps us to re-tune our spirits to walk to the Upper Room, see the agony in the Garden, weep at the cross, and rejoice with Mary on Easter.

The jars in March include the Jar of Sacrifice (1 Kings 17:8-16), the Jar of Preparation and Fasting (Matthew 25:1-13), the Jar of Blessing (John 2:1-11), and the Jar of Abundance (Matthew 26:6-13). How will the "jar" of your spirit be blessed and filled during this season?

I have been blessed with the jars of abundance and grace here at Zoar. Back in January I announced my retirement from full-time ministry. After 40 years in ministry, 35 of them at Zoar, it's time for a change. August 9TH will be my last Sunday, and I am most grateful for ministry with you throughout these years. I have been blessed to share good news, to baptize, to offer Holy Communion, to be with you in the most joyous and most painful moments, even the "best hour of the week (Confirmation)!"

David, in Psalm 23, sings, "my cup overflows." So has my cup/jar here at Zoar. And the best promise is this: the large "jar" of the tomb is empty - - Christ is risen from the dead! The gift of Easter is the promise that in the midst of all that is happening God still has the last word, and that word is a word of grace, of life, of hope.

I know that our loving God will continue to bless the people of Zoar in the years ahead, and that there are even better blessings in the future. On the last day we will join around God's Throne in glory, but until then, God's amaZing love guides us through all change and all days, and fills our "jars" with grace. What a gift!

WORSHIP IN MARCH

March 1, First Sunday in Lent

Each year, Lent begins with a synoptic account of the temptation of Jesus. Jesus was genuinely human, suffering from the devil's temptations no less than we, and so he can stand by us when we fall into temptation tempted. We, too, conquer evil with the power of God's word: and that word for us is Christ. This weekend, our quest preacher will be the esteemed writer and Pastor Paul Hoffman.

March 7 and 8, Second Sunday in Lent

This weekend, we set off along with Abram, the great Patriarch, and Nicodemus, the Pharisee. In the person and example of Abraham, we discover that a right relationship with God does not involve earning a reward from God but entails trusting God's promises. With Nicodemus, we find out Jesus' mission and the reason behind his divine ministry. Psalm 121 is a song of assurance and trust: I lift us mine eyes to the hills; my help comes from the Lord.

March 14 and 15, Third Sunday in Lent

Our lectionary journey continues drawing parallels between the Old and New Testaments. Moses draws life-saving water from the rock at Mount Horeb. Jesus meets the Samaritan woman and reveals himself to be the water, Christ himself. Psalm 95 is a celebratory poem of praise for the rock our salvation. The most prolific writer of the New Testament one of the most profound truths about our situation, "for while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly." That is all of us, even the worst of us.

March 21and 22, Fourth Sunday in Lent

While salvation is represented by water on the third week of Lent, on the fourth, light stands in as an image for God's mercy. The story of the anointing of David, paired with the story of Jesus curing the blind man, brings into focus the gift of spiritual discernment, or the lack of it. While the new testament reading encourages us to seek the light that is Christ, Psalm 23 gives us the affirmation we need: "surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

March 28 and 29, Fifth Sunday in Lent

This week we hear two of the most iconic and memorable images of the bible: Ezekiel's vision of the valley of dry bones and Lazarus' resurrection, Jesus' greatest miracle. Psalm 130 poses a desperate and somber note of death, yet the apostle Paul reminds us, "he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you."

As in baptism we focus on a few images and ideas: water (thirst, sustenance), enlightenment (light), anointing (the reception of the Spirit, a personal Pentecost), death and resurrection (both spiritual and bodily).

As I prepare for this Lent, I am aware that, as Christians, we are to remember our baptismal vows as an opportunity for re-evaluation and stock-taking. We must ask ourselves: what must die, so we can facilitate new growth in our lives and in the lives of our community of faith?

I am sure these questions will solicit a myriad answer from all of us. But as demanding or unpleasant as that that task may be, it is our duty to exercise introspection. Copping out is not an option.

GIVING UP ORTAKING ON

The end of February marked the beginning of Lent. A period of 40 days leading up to Easter focused on reflection and prayer. These 40 days reflect on Luke 4:1 - 2 "Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished."

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and for the next 6-weeks are typically marked by some form of fasting or abstinence. In the Catholic tradition, fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and obtaining from meat on Fridays during Lent. In modern times, people are known to give up their favorite vices or unhealthy habits for Lent. According to the OpenBible Lent Tracker the top five things participants gave up in 2019 were: social networking, alcohol, twitter, chocolate, and meat.

Another approach to Lent is the act of taking something on. Attending worship every Sunday in Lent, attending Lenten Wednesday worship, participating in a bible study or reading scripture with your family every night at dinner. Perhaps you followed Pastor Tim on Twitter in 2017 when he did 40 days of tweets.

In the months of February, March and April there are many opportunities at Zoar to take on. Every week at Zoar there is Sunday school for all ages, Worship three days a week during Lent, Bible study on Wednesday and multiple special interest groups to join full of faith and fellowship. Consider this Lent "taking on" a deeper relationship with not only your faith but your church.

Lent is a time of reflection and repentance, of sacrifice and self-examination. But Lent is also, a season of hope – hope in the work God is doing in the world, even in the most challenging times. As you consider your place in this Lent season, if you struggle to decide what route to take in your discipline. Giving Up or Taking On. Consider joining ELCA World Hunger's 40 Days of Giving in hope for a world where all are fed.

In last month's newsletter we introduced the concepts of 40 Days Giving: Worship, Study, Reflect, Give, Pray, Hear and Sing. To the right is the calendar for the 40 Days. This is also available online at https://community.elca.org/40days. Print this calendar off or save the page to the right, put it on your calendar or add the calendar in your phone. Additionally, follow along on Zoar's social media accounts as we explore this calendar.

Each Sunday will focus on Worship with the reading of the Gospel. Pair this with attending church each Sunday in Lent. Each Monday will focus on Study, also available online at https://community. elca.org/40days is a study guide. At the beginning of the week explore themes such as Safety and Stability, Livelihoods, Justice for All, Leadership, and Renewal of Earth. On Tuesdays, we will be moved to reflect. A statement or quote and a question on your thoughts can be used to drive focus to your day. On Wednesdays, we will focus on Giving. Real life examples are shown of how your gifts impact the world around you. On Thursdays, there is a focus on prayer. Prayers for our earth, prayers for peace. Our weekly Thursday eblast will feature these prayers in our "Grow" section. If you are not enrolled in the eblast sign up on our website at http://www. zoarlutheran.com/contact/ Fridays, we hear God's word. Similar to the days of reflection consider reading these verses aloud to your family at dinner. Consider what they mean for you personally, your community and the world as a whole. Finally, on Friday, close your week by examining the verses of that day's hymn text. All of these hymns are also available online in different variations on YouTube.

PRAY: Use the prayers of intercession shown throughout the calendar this Lent as, together, we humbly ask for God's care and blessing over all creation. Prayers adapted from Sundays and Seasons (Augsburg Fortress, 2019).

HEAR: Read and reflect on the selected Bible verses for each week on your own, with your family or with a small group to hear the word of God this Lent.

 ${f SING:}$ To close each week — and to remind yourself of the hope to come in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ — read the included hymn text, either to yourself or out loud as a group, or consider singing the full hymn in your prayer group, Bible study or worship service.


ZOAR COURTYARD EASTER INSTALLATION

A favorite book of mine is "Prayer" by Richard J. Foster. A few special quotes are:

"Do not worry about 'proper' praying, just talk to God."

"He delights in our presence...we will discover that by praying we learn to pray."

"Jesus reminds us that prayer is a little like children coming to their parents."

As we grow in our faith we have the desire to spend more time with God... especially through prayer. Naturally over time we become aware of many ways to pray.

Over the past couple of months the "9:53" Sunday School class has focused on praying in differing ways to enhance our prayer life, such as Lectio Divina, Centering Prayer, the Prayer Labyrinth and praying the Psalms.

We are also creating a "Zoar Prayer Book" for everyone. Do you have a favorite prayer you would like to share with others?
