# **STEWARDSHIP & GENEROSITY**

Generosity is one of the chief attributes of God, the One God who has given in beauty through creation, in God's very self at the cross, empty grave, and in the bread & wine, and who breathes through us so that we too can be generous.

One of those who have received food and care from Feed Our Families has spoken that "without this generosity of food and support my family and I would not have made it through this week." And because of the giving of this congregation through the Church Building, the Red Cross received much needed donated blood this past summer.

God gave all for us. God's sacrifice was the way God's generosity reached its depth. Our sacrifice and generosity are examples of our love and thanks in return for God's awesome gift.

Much of church giving is only token giving, averaging about two percent of income. No wonder there is so little

joy or satisfaction in it! It requires no sacrifice! We have given only what we could easily afford, what we would not really miss.

Experience has shown that giving, to be meaningful and joyful, has to be sacrificial! Each will have to determine what amount or percentage is sacrificial for his or her circumstances. But experience again suggests that for most people sacrificial giving begins at five percent of income with proportions under five percent falling into the token giving category.

Church interest is often low, studies have shown, because investment is low. There is no sacrifice. It doesn't really cost anything. Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there will be your heart also." (Luke 12:34) Where is my treasure? That is where you will find your heart. May you find that your heart is in Jesus, and in care for God's people. Then your treasure will follow.

# ARE THERE BLESSINGS IN THIS PANDEMIC?

What? Why should I even ask that! Because of Covid-19 people all over the world have died, are recovering (slowly), have had their lives changed. Businesses are closing, and many have lost their livelihood. Doctors and nurses have put themselves into harm's way to care for the sick and dying. We are now becoming more familiar with masks, distancing, washing. Families live far away (or close), and visits may be too risky. Churches that are open in-person only see a portion of the people we used to see. More happens on-line. The political polarization and upcoming election have become even more concerning as we deal (or not deal) with this disease. And, in the midst of this, the murder of George Floyd (and countless others) have put racial inequity and disparity on center stage. Lord have mercy!

Maybe the first question could be reframed to, "What have I learned in this pandemic?" So, I offer some possibilities for our conversation:

- First and last where is God in all of this? I do not believe that this bringer of death and disease is a punishment that God inflicts on humanity, but rather, that God in love is present. Always. And God is working for good. I'm not always sure how, but I hold onto the promise in these tough times that God continues to do God's work through doctors, nurses, first responders, through neighbors, through scientists, as well as through God's unseen hands. God, in unconditional love, is here!
- This pandemic has awakened in many a call to hold onto what is important: family, community, hope, hygiene, justice/respect/love for people of all colors, all stations, all orientations, all gifts, all histories. Human life is sacred, because God is there in our midst.
- The church is not a building, but a people. Whereas
   I am grateful for modern technology for Zoom, social media, facetime I miss physical connections with God's people. But WE are church, both in-person and online. We are church where Jesus moves in us to forgive, to love, to pray, to give, to help, to praise. We are church, because we have

been washed and grafted into the Family of God. Connected forever. Loved forever.

These are just a few of my thoughts at this point, knowing that there will be months ahead with more thinking and praying, and mourning, and trusting, and waiting, and Covid-izing, and brokenness. But we will come out of this stronger, because God is already there, always here, and holding us in hope and promise.

Brothers and sisters, may you, in these months ahead, see God's hand visibly, and may your love for the neighbor shine each day. Blessings & hope in Jesus!


Even if there are no ashes to be placed this year we will have a time of thanksgiving and remembrance for those present at this time. Please contact Pastor Tim for more information.

November has always felt like a month of goodbyes. Nature, having regaled us with exuberant beauty, goes to sleep in gray and dark hues. The warm weather we enjoyed just weeks earlier moves south, and in its absence, hyperborean winds begin to impose their frosty economy on everything. Time itself seems to accelerate as the days increasingly shrink from lack of sunlight. We would not be surprised if a vague sense of melancholia begins to bubble up from deep within us. Sadness, after all, is how the body lets us know that we have lost something.

It is in the context of vanishing colors and our uneasiness with the passage of time, that we, people living in the Northern Hemisphere, experience the end of the Church year. Therefore, it is our great fortune that November begins by anchoring us with an act of thanksgiving, a grateful celebration where we commemorate the saints who have gone before us. In Feast of All Saints, our liturgies echo the sentiment Paul, the Apostle, shared in his letter to the Thessalonians: "...we ought always to thank God for you, brothers and sisters loved by the Lord, because God chose you as first-fruits to be saved through the sanctifying work of the Spirit and through belief in the truth. He called you to this through our gospel, that you might share in the glory of our Lord, Jesus Christ." (2 Thessalonians 2:13-14).



Perhaps, as we give thanks to God for the example and witness of those who have gone before us, we discover that November entreats us to reflect on our place -as children of God- in the great cloud of witnesses we read about in Hebrews 12. I suspect it also invites us to think about what it will mean to be caught up in the beholding of the beatific vision that awaits us all.

I have no doubt, the "song" in the third stanza of the hymn, Holy God, We Praise Your Name (ELW 414), is hinting at the mystical union, a foretaste of the feast to come, the experience of divine contemplation and adoration: "Lo, the apostolic train join your sacred name to hallow; prophets swell the glad refrain, the white-robed martyrs follow; and from morn to set of sun through the church the song goes on." I pray, dear friends that, buoyed by gratitude, one day, we may join the Church triumphant in giving God blessing, honor, and glory for all eternity.
