Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love.

-I John 4:7-8

Psalm 147:11 praises God's everlasting love with, "the Lord takes pleasure in those who fear Him, in those who hope in His steadfast love." Psalm 25 adds, "All the paths of the Lord are steadfast love and faithfulness, for those who keep His covenant and His decrees."

Join us this month in worship, praise and reading. As we finish the lessons of Epiphany and prepare our hearts for Lent, let us learn together about God's burning, transforming, healing, everlasting love for us!

Oh my, what a January 2021! Many thought that 2020 was going to meld into a beautiful new year with lots of hope, but here we are. The election crisis has developed into proportions that no one expected; Covid-19 keeps surging, and vacancies are slowly working their way into our arms; we have not addressed the inequalities between people of color and those of European descent; Pastor Cindy has accepted a call to Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Toledo; and life keeps going on.

Ah, the Church has a word to say: yes, the world keeps on turning, yes, from the beginning of time humanity has exercised its sin and brokenness, yes things seem to be the same, going down in a handbasket. But then, right there, when everything was lost for Mary Magdalene, she went to the tomb on Easter Morning expecting to find her dead lord, Jesus. His resurrection changes the whole world – nothing is stronger than God's love – nothing!

This month of February we will have two days of remembrance. The first is on the 14th, St Valentine's Day, a day to commemorate one who gave his life for his faith in Jesus, sending a love letter to his beloved; the second is on the 17th, Ash Wednesday, a day to remind us of our mortality and of God's grace.

Oh, how the world would be different if we focused on these two days! First, we would remember the love we have for each other, made in the image of God. Regardless of race or creed or color or politics or orientation what-side-of-the-tracks-we-grew-up-in, or anything we would see Jesus in each other, and love the stranger as well as the well-known. We would exercise the primary call to love one another, to wash each other's feet. Our world would be different.

Also, if we fully lived into the truth not only of our mortality (and therefore that we are not the most important being in the universe), but that God, in infinite love, became part of our mortality, bringing us into God's family. Yes, "you are dust, and to dust you shall return," but it is for this "dust" that Jesus died.

Brothers and sisters, keep your hopes up! Stay safe and healthy! Use this time in February to immerse yourself in the love that God has for you, and how you can share this love. And know, that in God's good hands, all things will come to good!

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will be held on February 17, 2021. In these crazy Covid days so many things that we have done we cannot do, but we are also reaching people electronically in ways we could not have imagined. There will be three elements to our Ash Wednesday observance this year.

First will be an in-person worship service at 11am. This will be a typical Ash-Wednesday service, in which the scriptures are read, sermon is given, ashes are "imposed," and Holy Communion is offered. Of course, there will be no Lenten Meal this year, but we will gather to begin our Lenten Journey.

Second, this worship service will be recorded and placed on YouTube, so that those who are unable to attend may join us on-line. This has become a real benefit for those who are not in this area but wish to connect to the Zoar Community and to our amaZing God. The service will premiere at 7pm.

Third, Pastor Tim will be in Zoar's parking lot from 5-7pm, with ashes in hand. You may drive up, receive a prayer of blessing, ashes "imposed" safely, and thus begin Lent.

In the midst of isolation, Covid disease and Covid deaths, this reminder of our mortality strikes home. But stronger than death or disease is the love of God that holds one to us. Jesus became a mortal to bring us into His blessed Kingdom.


GATHER/GROW/GIVE

The ELCA provides daily Prayer Ventures for each month of the year. From the ELCA:

"These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities and world. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church".

1 Pray that the Spirit will guide, inspire and shape the Future Church structure being implemented in the churchwide organization to renew our sense of purpose and activate the entire church so that more people may know the way of Jesus and discover community, justice and love.

2 Black History Month Give thanks for the gifts, accomplishments, influence and witness of our African-descent neighbors who stand together with us as partners in the gospel, doing God's work in the world. Though unified as siblings in Christ, we ask God to guide and help our church in its commitment to socioeconomic equity and racial justice and reconciliation.



3 Give thanks for our freedom in Jesus Christ and pray that we might use that freedom to proclaim the glory of God and serve our neighbor in obedience to God's word, will and ways.

4 Pray for the children, youth and family ministry leaders of our church participating in the ELCA Youth Ministry Network Extravaganza, "Holding Loosely." Pray that they will grow and be strengthened for ministry through this time of spiritual renewal, continuing education, networking and mutual support.

5 Pray for ELCA Global Mission and for our ministry of accompaniment with churches, leaders, institutions and companion agencies in Asia and the Pacific region as we work together to grow the church, share the gospel, equip leaders, serve the needs of communities, address issues of development and justice, and assist with disaster preparedness and relief

6 Ask God to help us listen to each other with respect and to address and heal the political and ideological divisions that discourage us from treating one another with love and concern as neighbors and siblings in Christ. Pray that the Spirit will unite us and lead us in the work we must do together for the well-being of our communities, nation and neighbors in need.

Illness, oppression, desperation and spiritual darkness are no match for the healing and redemptive power of Jesus Christ, the Son of God and our Savior.

Praise God!

8 Pray for all those who experience food insecurity across our nation and around the world. Ask God to help us envision how we can work together to bring relief and hope and to address the root causes of hunger and poverty.

9 Give thanks to God for people of all ages, cultures, races, life experiences and perspectives who are new to the ELCA. Pray that, as siblings in Christ, we will nurture and equip one another for participating in God's work in the world.

10 Give thanks and praise to God for God's abundant love, which "heals the brokenhearted, and binds up their wounds."

 $oxed{11}$ Pray for our outdoor ministry organizations and their leaders as they continue to discern and plan for adapting their ministries during the pandemic - especially as they envision what this summer might bring.

12 Thank God for our special relationship with The Episcopal Church, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1999. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, and pray that together we will find strength and new resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these uncertain and challenging times.

13 When have you felt proud, boastful or selfcongratulatory for your ministry, witness or service to others? Ask God to forgive you and to refocus your attention on the good news and blessings of grace given to us through Jesus Christ, which we are called to share without bias, hesitation or expectation of recognition or reward.

14 We are not much different from Peter, James or John, who were unsure what they were witnessing when God's glory shined brightly in Jesus during his transfiguration. Pray for patience and for faith in God's promise, that we, too, will someday experience glory and joy in the kingdom of heaven.

15 Pray for our new U.S. president, vice president and members of Congress, that they will find strength, support and unity for their difficult work of serving a diverse nation. Ask the Spirit to help us guide, shape and embolden our culture and nation so that we practice justice, care for our neighbors in need, strive for truth and support our global neighbors.

16 Pray that when people witness our actions and hear our words, they will see the light of the gospel and the love of Jesus Christ in us and will be moved to believe in God's love, forgiveness and actions in the world today.

17 Ash Wednesday Someone tracing the sign of the cross on our forehead with ash speaks to our need for physical reassurance that God has done something special and mysterious in the world through the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Speak to God about what this smudge of ash - the cross - means to you and says to people who notice it on your forehead.

There is a good reason why Jesus was known as a healer. According to the gospels, twenty-six different stories give witness to Jesus' concern with human suffering. We read in Mark's gospel that in Jesus' very first day of ministry, he announces his mission (1:14-15), recruits four disciples (1:16-20), and generates what today we would call "buzz" by casting out an "unclean spirit" in the middle of a sabbath worship (1:21-28). Then he heals the mother-in-law of one of his disciples (1:29-31) and sticks around to heal many who were sick or possessed by demons (1:32-34). He did this after trekking about twenty-five miles on foot from Nazareth to the Sea of Galilee, which was not too long after his time in the wilderness (1:12-13). I cannot imagine accomplishing all these things in a day. From a human standpoint, it demonstrates the high priority Jesus gave to physical well-being. Jesus' specific focus is not a mere demonstration of charity but a manifestation of divine solidarity.

Dear friends, I am comforted knowing that God never sleeps even when I tire and see nothing but gloom. As Isaiah wrote, God "does not faint or grow weary." When I feel down or unwell, I hope to pray the words of Shirley Erena Murray's hymn ("Let My Spirit Always Sing" ACS 1020):

Let my spirit always sing, though my heart be wintering though the seasons of despair give no sign that you are there

God to whom my days belong, let there always be a song.

February and March Youth Group Events






