As an adult, I am used to thinking that I should have much of life figured out, that I should have more answers than questions. When I was a child, my parents seemed to be inexhaustible sources of wisdom. In my experience, though—as a person in general and a parent in particular—I am constantly discovering new things and encountering questions I don't instantly know how to answer.

Maybe that's how it was meant to be. After all, God is the creator of questions and answers, snails and surprises. In Isaiah 43:19, God proclaims, "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" I can't know all there is to know about the natural world, or parenting, or anything else for that matter. No one can, and that is a gift. Realizing that we are not meant to know all the answers—that only God does—can liberate us. In those places of not-knowing, which are part of being human, there is space for God to do new things, to bring healing out of hardship, to cultivate delight out of ordinary moments.

If I let it, this not-knowing can be part of my joy as a parent, a friend, a person who's starting something new, a human being who seeks to live this life authentically. Not knowing everything means that I can be surprised in delightful ways.

The same God who created miniature teeth in the mouth of a tiny snail can bring about healing, life-giving surprises in my life, too. Even now, in this season of Easter, God is dreaming up, working on and bringing into being these unexpected delights.

GATHER/GROW/GIVE

The ELCA provides daily prayer ventures for each month of the year. From the ELCA:

"These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities and world. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church".

12 Pray that we will not forget nations or regions where conflict, civil war or other turmoil spread violence, displacement, suffering and despair; pray that leaders will seek just and peaceful solutions and reconciliation and attend to people needing safety and relief. Ask the Spirit to help us respond to these crises, especially through supporting Lutheran Disaster Response, ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service.

13 Ascension of Our Lord Give thanks that we have not been left alone in the world to fend for ourselves, but that Jesus gives us purpose and that the Spirit equips and guides us to participate in God's work in the world.

14 Remember in prayer the leaders, voting members and others gathering online for the assemblies of the Northern Great Lakes, East-Central Wisconsin, Southwestern Washington

and Saint Paul Area synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them in choosing leaders, proclaiming the gospel, growing the church, serving our neighbor and doing God's work in an everchanging world.

15 Remember in prayer the leaders, voting members and others gathering online for the assemblies of the Northwest Washington, North/ West Lower Michigan and Southeast Michigan synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them in choosing leaders, proclaiming the gospel, growing the church, serving our neighbor and doing God's work in an everchanging world.

16 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Set aside time each day this week to join Christians around the world as we pray for unity. Let this year's theme verse, from the Gospel of John, inspire you: "Abide in my love, and you will bear much fruit."

WORSHIP IN MAY

How marvelous it is that Easter is not just one Sunday but a whole season of fifty days! We believe the Church has wisely appointed a week of weeks for us: during Easter, not only do we continue to celebrate the resurrection, but we recommit and are strengthened in faith by God's new creation. Post-Easter living points us to the vision of the New Jerusalem but in the here and now. After Pentecost, we will continue our life-long attempt to further our understanding of God's grace from this side of eternal life. To put it briefly, in May, we complete the Easter cycle, celebrate the birthday of the Church on Pentecost, and wrap up the month by marking a theological mystery (the Holy Trinity).

MAY 1 & 2, FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

On Easter V, we reacquaint ourselves with the power of community: Jesus is the vine, and we are the branches, and as one author puts it, "connected to the vine, these branches are given a death-defying life free from fear." The tender hymn, O Blessed Spring (ELW 447), will give embody to the Gospel in the congregations' voice.

MAY 8 & 9, SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

We may be surprised to hear on Easter VI that God chooses to call us friends. As one scholar put it, the NewTestament reading for this Sunday presents us with the "countercultural idea that love of God, obedience to God's word in Christ Jesus, and love of neighbor are inexorably bound together." How may we understand that we are "friends" and also "children" of God? On another note, Easter VI will be Pastor Reichert's first weekend with us.

MAY 15 & 16, SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

On the forty-second day of Easter, Easter VII, we read how Jesus asked for the disciples to be protected so that they may not be lost. He prays for the disciples (that's us too!) to have their joy completed and live what they have seen and understood from their teacher. This Sunday also concludes the semicontinuous reading of 1 John. If believers already have eternal life, it is other than life after death: it is the joyful communal sharing in Christ's truth now.

MAY 22 & 23, PENTECOST

The portion of the gospel of John appointed for this Sunday reports on Jesus' last conversation with his disciples: "it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment." The apostle Paul (in Romans 8) complements Jesus' words: "And God, who searches the heart, knows what is in the mind of the Spirit because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God."

MAY 29 & 30, HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY

On this Sunday, the Church focuses on the teaching of the Triune nature of God. And while we may struggle to make sense of this doctrine, we remember that we are heirs with Christ by receiving the Spirit of adoption: nothing less, nothing more. A favorite hymn, Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty (ELW 413), will be our principal musical proclamation. Bishop Daniel Beaudoin will be presiding over Pastor Reichert's installation at all of our services.

There is a dynamic to the Easter season that implies outward movement. This centrifugal direction in the Gospel readings seems to be amplified in the church's calendar as we move toward Pentecost and beyond what some refer to as "ordinary" Sundays or the "green" season (referring to the worship paraments used in this time). As we transition out of the Incarnation/Redemption cycle, my invitation to us all is to think about what this outward movement means at the personal and communal levels.

The Easter hymn—written by Nigel Weaver for the 1993 gathering of the North American Hymn Society—The Risen Christ (ELW 390), speaks pointedly about this outward, other-oriented concern that spills over into social justice as a natural extension of our Christian living.

The Risen Christ

The risen Christ, who walks on wounded feet from garden tomb through darkened city street, unlocks the door of grief, despair, and fear, and speaks a word of peace to all who hear. The risen Christ, who stands with wounded side, breathes out his Spirit on them to abide whose faith still wavers, who dare not believe; new grace, new strength, new purpose they receive. The risen Christ, who breaks with wounded hand the bread for those who fail to understand. reveals himself, despite their ling'ring tears, enflames their hearts, then quickly disappears. May we, Christ's body, walk and serve and stand with those oppressed in this and every land, till all are blessed and can a blessing be, restored in Christ to true humanity.

May we indeed!


