"Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

I grew up loving fireworks. I loved the bright red, green and purple illuminating the night sky; the anticipation I felt as I waited for darkness to descend; that first robust note from the "1812 Overture"; the final boom of the grand finale.

Every year on the Fourth of July, my dad and I traveled to watch fireworks with family. Together we planned the best spots to lay our blankets, how to time our arrival to secure our patch of grass, and what to pack in the cooler. With each burst of color, I'd turn to my dad in delight and see his equally bright smile.

There's something sacred about bearing witness to the bright array of colors streaked across a dark, night sky. It's a reminder that, even in the darkness, light can shine.

Just as I had hoped my children would delight in fireworks, I also have dreams for how they'll live out their callings. I pray that they use their gifts to benefit others. I pray they'll know just how beautiful and needed it is to bear witness to God's light. I hope their light will dim the darkness.

God calls us to let our light shine before others, but sometimes fear inhibits us from taking action. I believe being a light for Christ means acting in faith even when we feel afraid, embarrassed or unsure how to move forward.

Like my children watching fireworks, we're not alone. We're being held too. God's arms encircle us in love and nudge us to step forward in faith.

WORSHIP IN AUGUST

This month's lectionary readings help us re-discover what is in a loaf, as we knead vigorously into the nature of bread (both metaphorically and as the graceful reality of eucharistic living). On August 15, we press the pause button on bread to commemorate the feast of Mary, Mother of Our Lord, which always takes place on this date but seldom falls on a Sunday. Following, Lutheran biblical scholar Gail Ramshaw provides some insightful notes on our scripture selections, supplemented with local worship plans.

JULY 31/AUGUST 1 – From Hunger To Living Bread

Today's texts move us from rumbling tummies and flaring tempers refocusing us on unexpected blessings and the Giver. Today we think about the gifts of God, which come in many ways: it is Christ we are believing in, in whom we place our life's trust. Both the manna and the barley bread of the feeding story become metaphors for Christ and the life he gives. I am the Bread of Life (ELW 485) will serve as our vehicle to proclaim the Gospel.

AUGUST 7/8 – Christ, The Bread of Life

The reading from Ephesians includes a profound interpretation of Christ's ascension: Christ has not left us, but now fills all things. That is, Christ ascended into the cosmos, infusing all the earth with himself. Such an understanding of Christ's resurrection and ascension leads us to a green Christianity: Christ is not away, up in heaven somewhere, but rather Christ fills the earth, its vegetation, its countless species, pouring into all that is God's grace. Our Hymn of the Day will be Soul, Adorn Yourself in Gladness (ELW 488).

AUGUST 14/15 – Mary, Mother of Our Lord

Today we remember Mary, mother of Jesus. The haunting words of the Magnificat remind us that the child who grows in Mary's womb comes to change everything. No longer will some starve while others feast. These words come to us as both hope and challenge: hope for those in need, and challenge, at least, for those of us who live in comfort. How do these words from Mary challenge us? How can these gospel words be good news for our community?

AUGUST 21/22 – The Bread of Eternal Life

Jesus' teaching about eating his flesh and drinking his blood isn't something we can figure out and accept on our own. In his explanation of the third article of the Apostles' Creed, Martin Luther writes these words: "I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him." The good news of Jesus is too radical, unsettling, and illogical for us to accept. This weekend, the hymn Eat this Bread, Drink this Cup (ELW 492) will cap the Word portion of our service.

AUGUST 28/29 – Authentic Religion

After a few weeks of John, we return to Mark to delve into the meaning of true religion. Or we may get a lectionary surprise. Stay tuned!

Dear Zoar Family,

All Creation Sings, the most recent hymn collection to grace this Lutheran musician's bookshelf, introduced me to "Faith Begins by Letting Go," (ACS 1104) a meditative musical offering that speaks eloquently to what ought to be the Christian attitude toward life. Written by Carl P. Daw Jr., this hymn recasts ancient knowledge (Paul and several others) regarding what it means to be a follower of The Way. It reminds us to mind our disposition (or attitude) by casting them with the intentionality of simple actions (letting go, holding on, reaching out) that have important implications for how we think about our past, present, and future. As we continue to wade forward in the waters of change (with their attendant hellos and goodbyes), I commend this sage advice to each one of us.

> Faith begins by letting go, giving up what had seemed sure, taking risks and pressing on, though the way feels less secure: pilgrimage both right and odd, trusting all our life to God.

> Faith endures by holding on, keeping mem'ry's roots alive so that hope may bear its fruit; promise-fed, our souls will thrive, not through merit we possess but by God's great faithfulness.

Faith matures by reaching out, stretching minds, enlarging hearts, sharing struggles, living prayer, binding up the broken parts; till we find the commonplace ripe with witness to God's grace.




