## A homegrown faith

In my home office, directly behind my writing desk, you'll find a massive Bible that holds much more than Scripture. Inside are the handwritten notes, quips and quick thoughts of my grandmother, my great-grandmother, my great-grandmother and various other relatives.

My religious devotion rests upon not only Scripture but also the people who penned these notes of faith for their family, a faith found less in sanctuaries than around my grandmother's Singer sewing machine and my greatgrandfather's Chevy.

Our own blessed Martin Luther deeply understood this familial exchange of faith. Luther's ideas on messy grace fit quite well with his notion that theology is a from-the-ground-up exercise for Christians, modeled on the day-to-day work and family life of ordinary people.

Most mornings in the Luther home, you would find the whole family gathered around the dining table for devotions. Martin and Katie and their six children would all study the catechism together,

learning from one another. Luther saw this as both a particular responsibility and a particular opportunity for a family.

The parent in me knows that this catechism study was no Norman Rockwell painting. Children are noisy. Parents are temperamental. Toddlers are distracting and distractable. The scene wasn't pristine—no family gathering is.

But Luther saw real benefit in the family learning the catechism together. It would be easy and, I think, ill-advised to romanticize the Luther family. All households have dust in the corners, yelling in the halls and moments of ill temper. But the catechism reminds us, as it surely did Luther, that love and forgiveness are part of the faithformation process.

Unique for its era and still instructive today, the Luthers' approach grew not only from the Scriptures themselves but also from the intentional interactions of their family, gathered around words of faith.

Grace and Peace from God our Father and from our Lord and savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

Our nephew is in the military; have I told you that before? He had an, interesting, high school career, but because of amazing, dedicated encouragement by his parents, recruitment officer, and so many who care about him, he graduated, did great at boot camp, and went to work serving his country. He's been in quite a few years now, and has been deployed in many places including Iraq and Hawaii.

Because he is often deployed so far away, when he is able to come home, it is a big deal! Lots of times it is around the holidays, so we need to begin planning schedules and getting ready weeks before he actually gets here so that we can see him. Sometimes, with it being around holiday times, we actually get to celebrate with him! Other times, we are scrambling just to see him for a few hours before he heads to his next thing. And as wonderful as it is seeing him, it is also sad that he has to leave us so soon.

Advent is like that. We know that Christmas is coming, and we start way ahead (sometimes, if we go by the display isles in the stores months and months ahead) to make our preparations. We try to figure out the holiday schedules and sometimes get frustrated how difficult it is to carve out time with the ones we love. We sometimes get so focused on all there is to do to prepare for Christmas that Advent can just seem like a blur. And when we finally get to Christmas, somehow, even after all the rush, it is wonderful and sad that it is gone so soon.

In Advent, we remember that Christmas didn't just spring upon us; that a savior giving his life wasn't a happenstance. God so loved the world...you know the rest. God had a plan to save a dying world from sin, and that plan didn't begin on Easter morning, or in the tomb, or on the cross, or even in a stable. Hundreds of years before the Prophet Isaiah wrote, "for unto us a Son is born, unto us a Son is given." God's plan of saving you and me began long ago, and there was A LOT of waiting, and planning, and frustration and joy and sorrow and joy again.

On Christmas, if we can pause in our rushing for the tiniest moment, that joy and wonder (and sadness and hope) break into our lives; reminding us that God doesn't wait until you or I have it all together. God comes into the messiness of our lives to give us the same message we give our nephew, "You are loved; you are precious; it is so good to be with you."

# **WORSHIP IN DECEMBER**

Advent starts with narratives from the Gospel of Luke, which is surprisingly full of idiosyncratic details. Luke, for example, prefers to use the title "Lord" ("Kyrios" in Greek) but in a way that makes us think of a benefactor and not a ruler. So let us pay close attention to how the writer Luke tells these stories. The following capsules have been adapted for local use from Sundays and Seasons.

#### DECEMBER 4/5 – ADVENT II: YOUR KINGDOM COME ON EARTH

John's words tell us to examine our own lives and the world around us. We should not be complacent in the face of injustice but instead, seek forgiveness and strive for lives that bear fruit according to God's vision for the world. God will not settle for the way things are, and God's salvation will be made known in the one who is to come: Jesus.

#### DECEMBER 11/12 – ADVENT III: NO MORE BUSINESS AS USUAL

The crowds keep following John the Baptist, even when he raises the bar on them: John invites them to turn away from the old life and toward God's new life. But John has even better news: The Messiah is indeed coming, one who will not only call people to high expectations but also enable that faithful living. At our eleven o'clock service, children of the Sunday School will present a Christmas program.

#### **DECEMBER 18/19 – ADVENT IV: BEING RECOGNIZED, ENCOUNTERING CHRIST**

After the annunciation, Luke writes that Mary travels to visit Elizabeth, who gives this unmarried pregnant girl a haven and the first glimpse of what it means to be the mother of the Savior. The encounter is full of mystery and grace: the mystery of new life and the grace of recognizing each other as Spirit-filled mothers.

#### **DECEMBER 24- CHRISTMAS EVE: SALVATION TO ALL**

In Bethlehem, God's power is revealed in weakness, and the people who count include even the migrant laborers keeping watch over their flocks by night. So what does it mean that when God takes a census, all the people of the world matter as much as any citizen of the empire?

#### **DECEMBER 25/26- CHRISTMAS I: BECOMING WHO WE WERE INTENDED TO BE**

We celebrate that Jesus has come among us to free us from sin and restore human nature's dignity. As God's children, it is never too soon to begin the work of ministry. The scriptures help us recognize that each one of us is called through our baptism. As we answer it, we become who God intends us to be.




