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GOD'S SON WILL RISE AGAIN

Once, after a 4 a.m. wake-up with my son, I asked him why he had risen so early. He lifted his arms up, looked at me and sighed, "The sun was taking so long to come up!"

I know what he means. Perhaps you do too.

For many, the season of Lent can feel like a period of exasperated waiting – waiting for a sense of normalcy, a hopeful diagnosis, a positive pregnancy test, an answer, a new job or simply a moment of rest. Throughout Lent's 40 days, God calls us to remember our mortality, seek repentance and turn toward the cross. During Lent, we wait eagerly for Christ's resurrection.

Some days, waiting feels impossible. We worry the sun may never come up and, like my son, we become impatient. At other times, waiting brings us to our knees in worry. We stay in bed, wondering how we'll muster the courage to face what the day brings.

Even when we face uncertainty and temptation, we can trust God will provide for us.

Lent begins in the wilderness, where Jesus is famished (Luke 4:2). He's been tempted over and over by the devil. With each temptation, Jesus responds with Scripture.

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God's word provides Jesus assurance and hope during his hard waiting season.

God's word can strengthen us while we wait as well.

On the first Sunday in Lent, our lectionary texts take us to the wilderness but also to a place of refuge. We hear: "My refuge and my fortress; my God, in whom I trust" (Psalm 91:2). The reading from Deuteronomy reminds us of God's generosity, inviting us to see the abundance of gifts before us and to return our gifts to God (26:1-11).

Even when we face uncertainty and temptation, we can trust God will provide for us.

Wherever you are, however you feel this Lent, know that you're not alone. As you wait, God is with you. Imagine God holding you or sitting with you in the wilderness. Let God's word be your shelter – words of comfort, healing and hope – when you feel worried or impatient.

Today and in the days ahead, stay hopeful. God is our refuge and strength throughout Lent and into the resurrection to come. The sun – and God's son – will rise again.

Christ IS WITH US

A month ago, I looked out my Zoar office window, and there they were. In the shelter next to the building, there they were; little signs of hope breaking through the cold, almost frozen Earth, a whole bunch of daffodil buds poking up to say, hang on, hope is coming. It was one more confirmation, even with a dusting of snow on them the next morning, that spring was really on the way. The snow is melting; the birds are returning; and the seed packets are starting to show up in the stores. All of these are so reassuring because we know that they mean spring is really on the way.

But I took a picture of the front of our house a few days earlier, and it looked almost exactly the same as the one from the middle of January, AND the middle of February! Did anyone else start to feel like winter would never leave? I know that even though I really enjoy winter, that last big snowfall didn't give me very much 'kid at Christmas' excitement; just, "oookay, more shoveling." Sometimes life feels that way, like it is Lent forever and that Easter will never get here. Sometimes we seem to be in the darkness and pain of Good Friday, and we can't even imagine it going away. Or, we are stuck in Saturday between Good Friday and Easter, with nothing horrible happening right then but no real hope of getting out of it either.

But that is why the cross is such a sign of hope. Jesus knows our pains, our suffering, our sense of being all alone. Jesus knows and is with us in the middle of them. In giving his life on the cross, Jesus not only saved us from the power of sin; he joined us in the darkness where we feel so lost. So even in those ugly places of our lives, Christ is with us. In the, "I can't take it anymore!" places; Christ is with us. In the times that never feel like they will end places; Christ is with us, walking beside us and reminding us that Easter is coming; that hope wins the day; that God's love is greater than anything we can throw at it.

The second half of this month, April 17th, we will celebrate Easter; the great festival of Christ's Resurrection. It's the reason that we remember everything else. Not Jesus' death - lots of people were tortured and crucified. Not Jesus' teachings – lots of people have had great things to teach humanity. Not Jesus' birth - we all got here that way. No, it is Easter that changed how a tiny group of frightened disciples, who had been hiding for days, saw everything that had gone before. And that life transforming promise of Easter changed the world. Because of Easter, hope breaks into brokenness, divorce, depression, addiction and despair. Because of Easter, we reach out to those in need even when the needs of the world seem overwhelming. Because of Easter, we walk in hope even on the days when it is hard to see it. Like the coming of spring.

WORSHIP IN APRIL

There are many lessons to be gained from having a close relationship with the lectionary gospels in this year's pericope. But in the interest of brevity, let us boil it all down and reduce our cauldron of insights to one tiny but delicious bowl of condensed wisdom: God's love is always extravagant, lavish, unstinting, and over the top (period-full stop!).

APRIL 3, FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

As we enter the final week of Lent, we hear in clear terms that the perfume Mary uses on Jesus' feet is, in fact, a preparatory gesture for Jesus' own burial. As scholars have observed: "Mary's action in the face of death is bold. She anoints a corpse and, in so doing, honors Jesus' vulnerability and his life. Moreover, she models love for the other disciples and for us." As narrated by John, Jesus' impending sacrifice puts salvation ahead of us: love for God and love for others is the natural outcome of God's grace.

APRIL 10, PALM SUNDAY

The whiplash we experience on this day is always shocking. The day begins with praise and excitement but quickly turns to denial and cries of crucifixion. Our annual reading of the Passion, where we read Luke together during worship this year, is a sober introduction to Holy Week. Viewed from another angle, the Passion is a meditation on the cost of discipleship, a reminder of how we are caught between faithfulness and betrayal. As one observer commented, "while Peter withholds everything for his own sake, Jesus, for the sake of others, withholds nothing. As disciples fail to claim their place with Jesus, Jesus' embrace claims them. From the cross, Jesus offers mercy wide enough to claim even those who do not know what they do."

APRIL 14-16, TRIDUUM

Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil of Easter are indeed one liturgy spread out over three days. This three-day liturgy is at the core of our faith. On Thursday, we honor God's command, the "mandatum," that we love one another (as God has loved us). On Friday, we meditate on the meaning of God's death. On the Great Vigil, we light the Easter fire, hear the great stories of God's grace, remember our baptism, and finally, give thanks for the gift of salvation by celebrating the Eucharist - the "good gift" of God's meal.

APRIL 17, EASTER SUNDAY

The Resurrection of Our Lord is the most important day in the Christian calendar and the beginning of a whole season of festivities in the Church's calendar. We celebrate the "transfiguration" of the cosmos and how God has upended the "order of things." As pastor Jeffrey A. Merkel has said, "the resurrection of Jesus changed death. No longer can we look at death and see only death. Whether we whisper it in prayer before the darkness or dive in to grasp hold of it and pull it forth like a man drowning, we proclaim, Christ is risen! Moreover, we are called to go forth with the women from the empty tomb to all the places of struggle, all the greened-up tombs our culture makes, there to witness to the power of God."

APRIL 24, SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

Today we hear the familiar story of Thomas' doubt. But, more importantly, we also hear the most concise expression of our faith: Thomas comes up with one of the most concise creeds in all of scripture: "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28).

As we approach Bright Week, as our Eastern siblings in faith call it, I will skip over the first half of the month and refer you to our article on Worship in April for details regarding the fifth Sunday in Lent, Palm Sunday, and Holy Week. In this column, I will go directly to the Great Vigil and Easter Sunday out of a desire to share with you one of my favorite texts for this time of the year. This Easter Orthodox verse (usually called the Paschal Troparion) has been widely used since the sixth century, but it is probably of much older provenance. Christos Anesti ek nekron, thanato thanaton patisas, ke tis en tis mnimasi, zoin charisamenos!" is its usual transliteration. "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and to those in the tombs, granting life" is a text heard multiple times during the great feast, either spoken or in chant form, often as congregational response to verses taken from the psalms. Some translations of the Greek have striking associations: from the Hulk-flavored "Christ stepped into death and crushed it underfoot," passing through the swift and lean efficiency of "Christ died, and by his death, He killed death," to the Mobius logic of "Christ died, and by stepping into death, He stepped on it." Whichever translation appeals to your imagination, they all point to the same wonderful mystery of faith: death doesn't have the last word.


