"Or suppose a woman has 10 silver coins and loses one.

Doesn't she light a lamp, sweep the house and search
carefully until she finds it? And when she finds it, she calls
her friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with
me; I have found my lost coin.'" (Luke 15:8-9)

The new Yamaha S6X Grand Piano was delivered on Wednesday, May 18. What a blessing to the music program at Zoar Lutheran Church!

I am very grateful for the blessing of the new Yamaha S6X Grand Piano that arrived at Zoar Lutheran Church on Wednesday, May 18, 2022. I want to share the story of how this all came to be and how we came to select it, mainly because this piano, much like our organ, is a legacy instrument. The piano will continue to enhance our worship services and concerts for years to come. It's a blessing to generations of Zoar members and the community of Perrysburg.

This piano purchase is the result of diligent research, including in-person visits to dealers in Detroit, Ann Arbor and Cleveland. Given the options available, the Yamaha S6X was the most attractive instrument in the region, considering its characteristics and value. Other name-brand instruments of the same caliber would have been 20 to 30 years old or much more expensive. But I am getting ahead of myself.

Since 2014, the Worship and Music Committee has had conversations about the declining health of the Baldwin Model R Piano, which was a generous

gift from Robert and Janice Stein and has been at Zoar since the early 1990s. The Baldwin's serial number places its manufacturing date circa the early 1940s, so at almost 80 years old, the Baldwin's sound had become brittle, and the instrument was showing its age by not holding pitch (mainly because of loose pins.)

Fast-forward to 2022. Zoar had received a sizeable financial gift in memory of Russ and Nancy Heckman, who were very involved in the church's life. After discussions with leadership, the family felt that a new piano for Zoar would be an excellent way to honor the memory of Russ and Nancy.

So, we were gifted with \$65,000 to get a new piano! I consulted with Lee Rupert, Chair of the Worship and Music Committee. We agreed the ideal person to lead the negotiations would be our very own Paul Dodge, to whom I will forever be grateful for enthusiastically doing extensive research and lending us his expertise without hesitation. With a team together and having identified the Yamaha S6X as the

ideal instrument for Zoar (originally priced at \$86,000), Paul Dodge and Mr. Solich of Solich Piano in Cleveland had some discussions. Upon hearing about Zoar's vibrant music program and concert outreach, Mr. Solich took it upon himself to successfully negotiate a discount from the manufacturer. With the \$15,000 discount and the Baldwin R as a trade-in, we were able to bring down the total price to \$65,000. Friends, concert-level instruments are not cheap, but we got a fantastic, almost once-in-a-lifetime deal with this acquisition. So, I must say, again and again, that we have been richly blessed. My eternal gratitude goes out to the Heckman family, Paul Dodge, Lee Rupert and all of you who, over the years, contributed to the realization of this vision. This vision stems from the conviction that in everything we do, we always strive to give God our best. Soli Deo Gloria!



WORSHIP IN JULY

The lectionary serves a rich lineup of familiar biblical episodes: first, Jesus sends the 70 to proclaim the kingdom; then, the parable of the Good Samaritan; later, we see Jesus interacting with Mary and Martha; by month's end, we hear how Jesus teaches his disciples how to pray; and finally, we are reminded we are free in Christ from material concerns.

JULY 3: JESUS SENDS OUT 70 DISCIPLES

The first Sunday in July has an evangelistic focus. Jesus' disciples were sent out two by two to announce that the kingdom was near. As it turns out, sharing the good news is not a task that we can delegate to a few; on the contrary, it is to be done by the whole church. But consider the assignment Jesus gives to the ones he sends. In today's gospel text, we hear we must share the gospel with more than just words. We share the good news message by welcoming others, sharing bread with the hungry and offering compassion to the afflicted. Jesus taught his disciples to be good guests by graciously accepting what is provided, staying in one place without shopping around and accepting rejection without retaliating.

JULY 10: THE PARABLE OF THE MERCIFUL SAMARITAN

One of the impressive aspects of this famous parable is how it makes us reevaluate how we fit in it. Some days we read the story through the eyes of the priest or the Levite. Some days we feel like the Samaritan. And then there are those days when we are the person in the ditch. It is easy to miss the shocking nature of this parable if we start to think that this story only teaches us to imitate the Samaritan. On the contrary, the parable says so much more about God, our relationship with God and the lengths to which God will go to reach out to us. This Bible passage gives us so much more than Jesus giving us a comfortable morality tale reminding us to be nice, helpful, generous people.

JULY 17: CHOOSING THE BETTER PART

Contemplation vs. action. Devotion vs. service. We tend to think in contrasting pairs. Mary and Martha seem to represent these opposites. This tension builds in our gospel as Jesus addresses Martha's busyness, worry and distraction, juxtaposed with Mary's contemplation, focus and desire to sit at the feet of the teacher. We moderns must consider what "quietly sitting" means to us in our age of distractions.

JULY 24: JESUS TEACHES US HOW TO PRAY

One of my favorite table blessings from our new resource, All Creation Sings, is God Bless to Us Our Bread (ACS 1056), which we got to sing for a whole summer in 2019. It goes, "God bless to us our bread, and give bread to all those who are hungry and hunger for justice to those who are fed. God bless to us our bread." It is, in my opinion, a model prayer. We notice a few themes in today's gospels: negotiation, persistence and expectation. These themes continue in boldness as persistence is encouraged, even to the extent of being able to ask, search and knock, knowing that the Lord says we will always receive that for which we ask.

JULY 31: BE RICHTOWARD GOD, YOURTREASURE

Jesus tells us, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." I want to share Gail Ramshaw's meditation on this passage: "In baptism, we are joined to Christ's death, and we die to all foolish chasing after more possessions. We have died, not alone, but with Christ. Our lives now are hidden with Christ in God, and in Christ, we share a fortune of true riches that also are good for our neighbors. Death will come, but our treasure is already secure. We have acquired abounding riches above, and by faith, we are freed from storing up treasures for ourselves here on earth.

A colleague is fond of reminding others that after June 21, the Summer Solstice, it is all downhill: the creeping darkness gathers its strength as the days grow shorter. Upon hearing about this, a tinge of sadness enters my heart. For centuries, our physical and biological understanding of how days and nights affect us has been pressed into spiritual service - a documented practice in religion since the times the prophet Zoroaster first roamed and preached on the hills and valleys of Eastern Iran three thousand years ago. When presented with the light/dark pair, Christians tend to collapse the tension and resolve it by emphasizing light, even at the expense of a biblical witness that insists on a more nuanced view. In Isaiah 45:3, for example, we read: "I will give you the treasures of the darkness and riches in hidden places, so that you know that it is I, the Lord, the God of Israel, who called you by your name." More recently, writers in the tradition entreat us to approach God with a form of unknowing, as a great shadow under which we must sit. So let us sing Bryan Wren's Joyful is the Dark (ACS 1096):

Joyful is the dark, coolness of the tomb, waiting for the wonder of the morning; never was that midnight touched by dread and gloom:

darkness was the cradle of the dawning.
