# Karen Chair of Youth and Young Adult Committee

Hi there, Karen Mathison here. You might know me as Peter's mom or Emma's mom or a past church Council President. Right now I write to you as the Youth and Young Adult Committee Chair. Most chairs have four legs to make them easy to sit on. Ever sit on a wobbly chair? They feel unbalanced and are easy to fall off. As the school year begins and the fall season approaches, we all want a sense of four even legs on a chair. A recent article from Springtide Research Institute indicates that young people need more trusted adult relationships in their lives. Connecting youth with even just one additional trusted adult can reduce their feelings of loneliness, isolation and stress. But when young people are connected with five or more trusted adults it significantly changes the game positively for their life. That's where you come in. We all want a place to belong - a chair with four solid, strong legs to support and hold us up. In a recent report I counted more than 410 children/young people from birth to age 25 who are members of Zoar. Read that again. When they show up to help, serve, worship, sing, pray, to be here notice them, approach them, make them feel known. The more we do that as the grownups in their lives - the better the chair for them AND for you.

# **WORSHIP IN SEPTEMBER**

#### SEPTEMBER 3/4: FREED – FROM AND FOR

Moses reminds the people of Israel they have the freedom to choose between life and prosperity or death and adversity. Ironically, this freedom to choose life comes through the freedom to choose obedience to the commands of God. In other words, Moses tells the people, they are free to choose bondage to God and life or bondage to sin and death. Either way they will be bound to something. In Christ, freedom comes from letting go. Freedom comes through giving away and trusting Jesus. In Christ we are free people. Free to choose life, free to choose faithfulness, and free to open our arms wide and receive the free grace of God. This is the God who chooses to never stop loving us.

#### **SEPTEMBER 10/11: LOST AND FOUND**

God reconciles with the idol-worshiping people of Israel. The risen Lord calls the violent, blasphemous persecutor, Paul. The faithful shepherd rescues the wandering sheep and carries it home. The woman who lost one of her 10 silver coins searches for it until she finds it. Similarly, God doesn't abandon people even when people abandon God. The cross and resurrection testify to God's faithfulness in that regard. God rescues strays one by one, making the first move to find the lost and create new hearts in them. When Moses holds God to promises already made in the covenant, the breathtaking picture emerges of a God so committed to relationship that God is influenced—changed—by what people need and ask. This faithfulness of God, shared with overflowing grace in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus, is patient, forgiving, energetic and ready to celebrate. Take the bread and cup—Jesus hosts the worshiping assembly again this week to welcome sinners and eat with them! Suddenly, "sinner" is no longer the best name for us. Try "guest," "graced," "gifted," "loved" and "empowered." Then it's time to follow Jesus out of the gathered assembly and into the world as apprentice sleuths for missing persons, bent on finding the lost and the broken and giving them an invitation to come home.

#### **SEPTEMBER 17/18: LOVE OR MONEY?**

A rich landowner tells his unsatisfactory manager he's going to fire him. We don't know how long the employee had to clear his desk, but apparently it was long enough to win friends and influence the people who had accounts with his boss. The manager called them in and reduced their debt. When the boss heard about it, for some reason he didn't call his lawyer but sat back and laughed in admiration. How could Jesus tell a story where the main character is a crook? In God's economy, people matter more than profits. The prophet (first reading), the psalmist, and Jesus, telling the parable, agree on this. The epistle writer adds a prayer for "a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity" for everyone, boss and beggar alike.

#### **SEPTEMBER 24/25: PLACE-SHARING**

Today's gospel evokes our sympathy. It opens the possibility—described as an impossibility—of place-sharing, trading or sharing places with each other. It also echoes a common theme: the pursuit of wealth in this world can lead us into idolatry and away from faith in Christ. Instead, as the reading from 1 Timothy reminds us, we should pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness, so that there is no "poor man named Lazarus" dying at our gates. After all, the greatest treasure—our eternal salvation—has already been procured for us through Jesus' death and resurrection. Knowing this, we can share all we have with our neighbors, even our very place and salvation, confident that God will continue to provide for our needs.
