I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. ~ John 13:34-35

In our homes we are given many opportunities to build our faith and capacity to love. Gather, Grow and Give FOR JESUS

This month, we spend a lot of time in the Sermon on the Mount from the Gospel of Matthew. He begins with the Beatitudes and how God's blessing is not necessarily how they have always thought about it, and he continues calling people to a new kind of living with one another. This is far from the only time that Jesus reminds us that God's Kingdom isn't like every other kingdom.

Once when Jesus and His disciples were going through Samaria, they stopped by a well, and the disciples went on to

buy food in the village. Jesus stayed and had a profound encounter with a Samaritan woman who came to the well. To set the stage: Jewish men did not have many conversations with women they weren't related to; Jewish rabbis certainly didn't talk to strange women; Jewish people and Samaritan people pretty much hated each other for the preceding 500 years which would preclude a conversation. When Jesus' disciples come back they are astonished to see Jesus chatting with this woman, but at the same time don't think for a moment about asking Him if He lost his marbles or what in the world he was doing. (John 4:27) Why? Because they knew that Jesus was more interested in welcoming others than keeping up with the Joneses. They knew Jesus was more interested in doing the work of His Father with people than keeping feathers unruffled. They knew that Jesus was more interested in sharing the good news of God's kingdom than He was in gaining fame, prestige, power or riches. That is the journey of Epiphany from celebrating the visitation of the Magi on January 6 to the Transfiguration – this year on February 19. More and more people recognizing not only who Jesus is, but what His ministry is all about. Jesus reveals the Kingdom of God, and that God's forgiving love for all people is greater than ethnic heritage, greater than our rule-following, greater than the brokenness in our lives. Jesus willingly gives His life on the cross to prove that point, and in His resurrection, Jesus shows us that truly, nothing is greater than God's love for us. As we complete the season of Epiphany this month, the season of the light of Christ being revealed, we come to the beginning of the season of Lent. Lent is a season of introspection and examination. Which is another way of saying, "Are we more focused on Gathering, Growing and Giving for Jesus or on ourselves?" Have we spent more time on thinking about Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection for us or on thinking about who is going to win the Super Bowl? It isn't that we are to pretend we don't live in this world. Lent calls us to think about Jesus who wants our faith to be more than an hour on Sunday morning. Jesus has freed us to witness to the saving, freeing love of God in Christ. What could be a better job than that!

1. Workne BEGINS THE SEASON OF LENT

On Ash Wednesday we begin our 40 day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the Earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

This year's Lenten theme, Sing with All the Saints in Glory, takes us from the starting place of Lent reflecting on Jesus' death and resurrection and our own struggle to walk with Christ as we live simultaneously as saints and sinners. Then in the following weeks, we look to Christians from every age who have pointed to Christ in their living and dying. In remembering those who went before us, we are inspired to press on as well.

Worship & Music—This is Who We Are

Do you know who you really are? That may sound like a silly question. Of course you do — unless you are a teenager still working on defining who you are. I got my 1968 copy of Erik H. Erikson's *Identity: Youth and Crisis* off the top shelf of bookcase number one. (I know who I am: all my books are catalogued by the now out-of-date Dewey Decimal System. So, psychology is on the top shelf, and I am definitely OCD.) Professor Erikson identified eight crises of psycho-social development with the fifth crisis being that of identity versus role confusion, a crisis typically undergone in adolescence. You should have learned/become who you are as a teenager or else you are confused.

The trouble with defining critical stages of development is that we get the idea that once a stage is completed we should never have to revisit them. But we do revisit them as perfectly healthy people. We do reinterpret who we are. We do revisit other stages of development. *Once 'n Done* (my favorite kitchen floor cleaner by Armstrong) is not the way identity works. It's not the way grief with its five stages works.

Once and done is not the way God works with us, in us, or through us. Our readings in February continue with Jesus' growing understanding of himself as a teacher in the Sermon on the Mount and as the Son of God revealed in the Transfiguration (February 19). Then, bang, comes Ash Wednesday and Lent, and we remember that we are dust and to dust we shall return. (Expletive deleted.)

From Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the Prayer of the Day, the Sixth Sunday after Epiphany: O God, the strength of all who hope in you, because we are weak mortals we accomplish nothing good without you. Help us to see and understand the things we ought to do, and give us grace and power to do them, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **This is who we are.**

A Devotion for Gratitude and Love

Here we are in February 2023 with Valentine's Day right around the corner even though most stores are already stocked and selling items for the Easter holiday.

Each week during Sunday services, we give thanks to our Lord through prayer, song, lessons and messages for the abundance of life given to us in the form of time, talents and riches. We use our talents to excel at teaching the young; being a caring nurse, a focused pharmacist, a ship builder, an excellent parent or a fine public servant. Our time is used to volunteer at church, community events and family. We use our riches to sustain others through gifts, support of businesses, church efforts and family.

It is easy to forget or fail to recognize that everyone we know or encounter has also been blessed in the same way. It is simple to thank the doctor for solving a medical question, an EMT or policeman for helping in a very difficult situation or the pastor for comfort in a time of need. But what about others we depend on for routine daily service such as the wait staff at an eatery, a store clerk or cashier?

Keep in mind that everyone shares the same burdens of social disorder, political turmoil and economic uncertainty. This stress weighs more heavily on those working the hardest and doing the best they can. The wait staff covering nine tables rather than the usual six, the cook working alone in the kitchen because no one else is available, the store clerk trying to help three customers while the boss pushes them to stock the shelves, or the cashier working alone as the customer line grows longer and the phone keeps

This is where our gift of time can help with being patient in those situations. Thank them with a smile for helping. Use your riches to show appreciation to the wait staff with an extra kind word and generous tip. Use your talents to understand what is happening and figure ways to help where needed.

It is written in Ephesians 4:32: "...and be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you." Also in 1 Peter 4:9: "Be hospitable to one another without complaining." Or as Luke states more simply in Chapter 6 Verse 31: "Do to others as you would have them do to you." Some have amended that to read "Do to others as you would have them do to you – but do it first." Our moms simplified it even more as we have also told our children and grandkids, "Play nice with the other kids on the playground."

Let us pray. Our heavenly Father, we thank you for the abundance of gifts you have given us. We ask for help in understanding and sharing them with others in ways that honor you. That is the least we can do for you having sacrificed the most for us. In your name we live, laugh, love, share and pray. Amen.
